This is an opportunity to hear reports of activities in 2022 including the presentation of the audited accounts, churchwarden's report on the fabric of the church and churchyard, the bell ringers and Deanery synod report. Anyone can attend the annual meeting, only the church electoral roll members can vote to elect the PCC members who then elect their officers. Nomination papers are available from the church table. I'm Philip of PGlive

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A CAT'S TALE

There can't be many people in the village who have not seen Mandy and her dogs on their regular walks, always accompanied by a white cat – this is his story....

Rooney was born in my greenhouse in July 2010, looking like a chocolate box kitten, white & fluffy, along with his other two siblings, plus one black & white female. My daughter (Nicola) took both Rooney and his sister Roxy to live in Bow where both cats followed my young grandsons to school most days and quite often remained around the school until they came home. Nicola was called on numerous occasions to retrieve them from school. In 2014, Nicola moved to a new development in Okehampton, which meant Rooney and Roxy lived on a building site with all the heavy machinery constantly going up and down. This is where, I believe, he became very streetwise. During this time, Rooney was gradually driven out by his sister and became very isolated and scrawny. He was afraid of going home, understandably, as he didn't want to be attacked by his sister. Nicola became increasingly worried about him as his trips home were sporadic. In June 2017, he came back for an extended holiday in the heated greenhouse and has never looked back. With 5 star accommodation and meals on wheels, he soon put on weight. He started rambling with the dogs and me, becoming part of the pack, just as he had done earlier in his life with the children.

In 2020, Rooney ended up in the vets for 3 days on a drip with a form of pleurisy, during which time the vets told me the results of the X-Ray on his lungs had shown up a pellet embedded in his hip where we think he must have been shot! As it was an old injury and not of prime concern at the time, the vets released him saying they could do no more for him. I thought I would not have him home for long but somehow, he survived using up several of his 9 lives in the process.

To date the longest walk Rooney has taken with me (he insists on coming too), is down to the woods behind the Waie Inn and the circuit back round across the top of the vineyard to the Church at the top. He doesn't rush and is always behind, picking his way carefully; any dangers encountered and he's straight up the first tree! He doesn't like getting wet feet so I lift him over any boggy land. He loves mousing with the dogs and, to my great surprise, was triumphant getting one over on the dogs by being much more patient than them.

There is no doubt about it, Rooney is a show off too. As the picture on the next page shows, he likes to balance on the smallest of poles, having little or no regard for the watery depths beneath him. If Rooney is not given breakfast at a certain time, he will come to my bedroom door and let me know it's time, either by scraping the door or by shouting at me in his loudest voice – this works.

Rooney has the kindest, most lovable nature. without a mean bone in his body. Indoors he cuddles up to the dogs and has even curled up with my not-so-wild 'Shelby' tabby living in the greenhouse, who has been with us for just over a year.

GROWING WELL GARDEN

The new garden project at Bow Medical Practice is an example of something called "green social prescribing" which supports people to engage in nature-based interventions and activities to improve their mental wellbeing as well as their physical health. We're very grateful for the generosity of Devon-based The Cabin Company for another donation of timber which means we can build more raised beds. The next phase of development will see us adding more accessible planters and a central covered structure with seating. If you've got power tools, a passion for DIY and some spare time on your hands we'd especially love to see you!

From the end of March, with the help of "garden hosts" we'll be opening for regular drop-in sessions on Tuesday and Thursday mornings and, in time, we hope to be able to offer more specific activities. No gardening experience is necessary. We'd welcome any donations of garden tools in good/working condition (hand tools such as trowels, spades, forks etc) as well as clean plastic pots and seed trays/module inserts.

April is a busy month in the garden, with Spring coaxing out beautiful blooms and, fingers crossed, some lovely weather.

- 1. Apply a general-purpose fertiliser to borders and beds. Feed shrubs & roses, Bow has a large selection, including organic feeds.
- 2. Plant Summer-flowering bulbs, if not done already, and sow hardy annuals and herb seeds now.
- 3. If planting new trees, roses or shrubs use Mycorrhiza (a symbiotic fungus) to ensure healthy root growth. Empathy Rootgrow is available at Bow.
- 4. Prepare beds for the growing season. Dig in at least a 5cm layer of compost, and work in a general-purpose fertiliser, such as 6x, Growmore, or Fish, Blood and Bone.
- 5. If you haven't done so already, cut back any dead foliage on perennials and ornamental grass plants to make way for new growth.
- 6. Honeysuckle and Clematis will be putting on growth now, so tie new stems to train them along their supports.
- 7. Protect fruit blossom from late frosts by covering them with horticultural fleece on cold nights.
- 8. Continue deadheading spring bulbs and bedding, so they don't waste energy setting seed.

9. Clean ponds, and then add aquatic plants such as Waterlilies and water

Irises.

10. Make good use of April
Showers - attach guttering to
sheds and greenhouses and
install water butts. Rainwater is
much kinder to plants, as it
doesn't contain the chemicals
that tap water does.
