GOTLAND GIN

To celebrate a friend's special birthday, I researched tickets for a Gin Experience which led to the discovery of Gotland Gin at Highampton. Here, briefly, is the Gotland Gin story...


'After completing careers in the British Army, Dawn and Mark relocated to Devon. Both lovers of animals, we decided to set up our own smallholding amongst the rolling hills of West Devon. Gotland sheep were a favourite on the smallholding from the beginning. This is a very tactile breed of sheep originally from Gotland, an island off the coast of Sweden; they became the inspiration for our gin and remain an important part of West Devon life for us. After a busy day on the smallholding, we both enjoy relaxing with a glass of gin and tonic overlooking our flock, which gave us the idea to create our own hand-crafted premium gin. In order to create a unique product and maintain the link with our Gotland sheep, we explored a variety of Scandinavian fruits such as the lingonberry and, after much experimenting infusing a diverse range of botanicals, Gotland Gin was born'.

A visit to Gotland Gin is a very special experience and, if you like gin and sheep, one not to be missed. Dawn and Mark have created an outside bar in which visitors can relax and unwind with wonderful views of rolling countryside that surrounds their small holding, while sampling their amazingly smooth and refreshing gin and meeting the sheep that were the inspiration behind the unique drink. The pictures below illustrate what to expect from your visit and I can guarantee that you will get a warm welcome at Gotland Gin from Dawn, Mark and the sheep. CREDITON LIBRARY REMINISCENCE PROJECT

Crediton Library's Reminiscence Project is set to enter a new phase, thanks to funding from The National Lottery Heritage Fund. The funding, made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, will allow the library to continue gathering and preserving memories of Crediton and the surrounding areas.

So far, in partnership with the Folklore Library and Archive, the library has collected and made available a number of memories of the local area. These include recollections of life during World War Two, stories of farming and growing up in the countryside, as well as living through rapidly changing times. There are memories of the first lady to receive antibiotics in Crediton, life before mobile phones and a resident's memories of getting their first colour TV.

The Reminiscence Project was set up to collect memories from a range of people with a connection to the area, whether they have been residents all their lives, they once lived in the area or have only recently moved. These memories will be recorded in audio form, capturing the voices of the people they belong to. Over the next two years, there will be a range of events to open the collection up to the community.

Crediton Library is seeking volunteers, whether to carry out interviews, transcribe them or to help with outreach events. It is also looking for interviewees, whatever their age or background - anyone with memories of Crediton and the surrounding areas is welcome! Garden Advice from Bow Garden Centre

- 1. Add more Winter colour such as cyclamen, violas, pansies and wallflowers to brighten up your garden.
- 2. Watch out for pale blotches and fuzzy grey mould on leaves of Winter-flowering pansies that can be symptoms of downy mildew. Remove infected leaves as soon as discolouration appears.
- 3. Use fleece for frost protection wrapping around less hardy plants and insulate greenhouses with bubble wrap.
- 4. Continue planting trees, shrubs and hedges (Bow have an expanded selection in store, including many evergreen).
- 5. During Winter pruning remove mummified fruit that remained on branches, and continue checking supports and ties of cane fruit, grape vines and fruit trees trained against walls.
- 6. Clear debris to prevent slugs and snails from setting up home in damp conditions. However, it is important to leave some cover for other wildlife.
- 7. Get pruning wisteria, roses & Japanese maples to help improve their growth next season.
- 8. Harvest holly with berries for making Christmas garlands & wreaths. Stand them in a container of water until you're ready to use them.

9. Buy a pond heater to prevent ice forming, leaving an air hole free for toxic fumes to escape.

10. Don't let leaves accumulate, especially around alpines - they will die if left damp for long. Cover bare patches around clumps with gritty compost to encourage regrowth.


