AMAZING- nearly 150 people visited the Zeal Monachorum History Exhibition over the 2 days of the jubilee, some returning more than once. They included people who'd lived here all their lives or for only a short time, those who had moved away and those whose family or ancestors had lived here. It was such a pleasure to see people in deep conversation with those they hadn't seen for years and talking with others they didn't know at all.

I'd like to thank everyone who came. I spent the last 5 months researching and putting it all together and this incredible response makes all the hard work worthwhile. A special mention and thanks must go to Isabel Harris who has been in touch with many of the local farming families to gather photographs and memories etc. These were in folders on display at the exhibition - they are fascinating and an important addition to the history of Zeal. I've been very pleased that people have again been giving me more things for the archive. I like to make a digital copy of the original and then return it to its owner. So, when you are having a clear out, check whether those old photos, deeds and documents might be worth saving for the archive.

During the exhibition I relied on a wonderful team of volunteers who gave up their time to welcome and look after the visitors, and help to set up and take down the exhibition. An enormous amount of work was done by David Bowyer in resurrecting old exhibition stands, well past their prime, and in repatriating much better stands back to the village hall. Having the latter display stands will make it possible, in future, for me to put on smaller, selective history exhibitions more frequently and opens up possibilities for others who might like to mount exhibitions of art, photography etc - so watch this space.





ZEAL MONACHORUM PARISH COUNCIL

On May 26th the annual Parish meeting was held. Following the Chairman's report, representatives from the church (PCC), Monachorum Matters and the Village Hall committee gave their accounts of the year's proceedings. This was followed by the annual Parish Council meeting at which Andrew Chandler expressed his wish to stand down as Chair and member of the Council. He has agreed to be available in a consultancy capacity. Andrew has worked diligently, with few stones unturned, during his years as Chair and leading member of the parish council. He will be a hard act to follow.

It fell to me as Vice Chair to take his place and Ken Hogg was unanimously elected as Vice Chair. Andrew's resignation also means that we are one member short on the council. If anyone is willing to put themselves forward to be co-opted, there is a procedure, largely governed by MDDC, of which the Clerk will post details on the bulletin board in due course.

The May Ordinary Meeting was next on the agenda. Copies of the proposed canopy for the Jubilee Seat (2002) were circulated and agreed. The plans will now be put forward for planning permission, which may be complicated as we are in a Conservation Area.

The council's accounts were presented by the Clerk, they were discussed and approved. The Council's finances are in a healthy position at the moment, but there are some significant payments on the horizon, particularly the canopy for the Jubilee Seat.

The meeting closed at 20.30. The next Parish meeting was set for July 28 at 7pm.

Isabel Harris sent in the following...

Sadly, Little Titch, who I brought along to the May Village Market, passed peacefully away the same evening. As I explained at the time, he was born very small and, if it wasn't for my care and attention, he would have perished long before. Thousands of wild baby ducklings die at an early stage of their life, either by predators, the weather or parental neglect. As David Attenborough says in his TV programmes, Mother Nature can be very cruel.

On a more positive note, I have hatched out two Pheasant chicks, from 22 eggs (these were given to me from a nearby hatchery, not taken from the wild). Some of you met these chicks at the Village Jubilee celebrations, when they were on view outside Glebe Cottage where Lynn and I were manning our stalls in aid of the Devon Wildlife Trust (DWT) and Farm Crisis Network (FCN). We are pleased to report £90 was raised for DWT and £36.50 for FCN and both Lynn and I thank all those who supported our stalls. I will be running a regular fund- raising stall for FCN at forthcoming village markets so if anyone has anything suitable to sell, please bring it along. I may bring along my latest hatching of Aylesbury ducklings! Thank you.

JULY GARDEN ADVICE FROM BOW GARDEN CENTRE

July is a wonderful time to enjoy your flourishing garden & catch up with friends and family over a BBQ. Make the most of the (hopefully) good weather, and take a look at these tips on what needs doing in the garden this month.

- 1. Make time for regular weeding so they won't have time to set seed.
- 2. Keep on top of watering, but avoid at sunny times of the day. Early morning and late evening watering are recommended to reduce evaporation. Add mulch around plants to retain moisture.
- 3. Continue deadheading bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, like roses, to ensure continuous flowering throughout the season.
- 4. Summertime means that everything will be growing extremely fast. As a result, mow your lawn once a week to keep it in good health.
- 5. Water any trees, shrubs and perennials that you planted in spring. Keep the base well-watered and avoid wetting the leaves as they don't absorb water well, and can encourage fungal diseases.
- 6. Keep your garden abuzz with wildlife by ensuring bird feeders are topped up and bird baths are full, as birds in particular relish gardeners' efforts, using bird baths to both hydrate and cool down.
- 7. Start sowing biennials, such as foxgloves, forget-me,nots & wallflowers, for beautiful blooms next year.
- 8. Dahlias will be growing well to produce more flowers, cut
 the first bloom to a very short
 stem (avoid cutting into the
 flower buds below.)
- 9. Cover two thirds of your pond with pond plants to help prevent & build up of algae.
- 10. Now is a great time to get planting some autumn bulbs in pots & borders including, nerines, colchicums & sternbergia.

DEN BROOK COMMUNITY FUND

Grant Applications are invited from Charities, Voluntary Organisations, Not-For-Profit organisations and Social Clubs based within the five parishes of Bow, North Tawton, South Tawton, Spreyton and Zeal Monachorum. The closing date for this round of applications is 31st July 2022.

Background:

Over the past five years, the fund has been able to allocate grant funding totalling over £243,500 supporting 47 different local Capital Projects. As a guideline, it is anticipated that the funds available to organisations based in **Zeal Monachorum** for this coming financial year will be approximately £2,550.00.

Community Benefits:

Applicants must be able to identify how their project will contribute toward the seven community benefit objectives the Committee originally identified, which are-

- a) Improve local physical health and mental well-being
- b) Promote the care and support of disadvantaged or vulnerable people
- c) Encourage and support voluntary activity, community spirit and participation through social, sporting and cultural activities.
- d) Improve local employment opportunities
- e) Produce deliverable benefits to local communities which provide a sustainable legacy over an extended period of time
- f) Provision of environmental benefits which contribute to energy efficiency initiatives
- g) Promote equality of opportunity through delivery of neutral, secular, and a-political outcomes.

Next Steps:

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
