


#### PLATINUM JUBILEE POSTER COMPETITION

# ZEAL MONACHORUM HISTORY EXHIBITION THURSDAY 2nd & FRIDAY 3rd JUNE 2022

The Jubilee Group has decided that another Zeal Monachorum History Exhibition would be a good addition to the Jubilee celebrations. Consequently, I have started to put one together from the archive I have collected since moving to Zeal 38 years ago. Initially I was interested in finding out about our old cottage. The best source was local people and the WI. The latter had scrap books made in the 1970s containing newspaper cuttings, photographs and more.

In 1990 I mounted an exhibition for the WI; then in 1994 in the Village Hall for everyone; in 1995 for the Zeal Recycling Group's AGM; another in 2004. The biggest exhibition, so far, was in 2009 which ran for 1 evening and 2 days. Over 200 people attended, not just from Zeal, but also from more distant parts. Each time I was amazed by the interest; people would be looking at an old photograph and pointing out those they recognised only to have the person next to them say 'that's me' and find that they knew each other from childhood.

Many people have helped by sharing documents, naming those in photos, telling stories of life in Zeal, seeking out information and generally making collecting the archive a pleasure. Of course, history is still happening and I believe it is as important to collect information, memories, posters, photos etc from this moment and this year as well as the distant past. The Archive will never be complete!

All the material I am loaned is carefully copied and returned to its owner, unless they have donated it to the collection. With the advance of technology, where possible, I have made digital copies so they can be easily shared and viewed on a computer or other device. I now look after about 500 photographs between late 1800s and the 1970s. I have catalogued these digitally so they can be searched, for example, by the names of people in a photo. The Archive contains thousands of modern photos of people, events, houses and landscape; old Ordnance Survey and other maps; aerial photos; the censuses for Zeal 1841-1939; newspaper cuttings; reminiscences; letters from those on military service; conveyances and land records and more. Examples include: a handwritten sheet of the words for the music the WI Kitchen Band played as it marched in 1956; a butter making certificate from 1926; a programme from an Irish Village Fete in 1914 - these may all seem trivial things which would be likely to be thrown away, but they really help to bring the past to life.

I suspect there is much more to be found and I am asking you to dig out for this next exhibition: school photos; albums; Zeal ephemera; postcards; letters; house and land records. I'd love to hear your stories and memories, old or new, about life in Zeal. They could be written down or simply tell them to me and I'll try to write them down for you, or record them.

While clearly it will be of great interest to anyone who has ever had connections with Zeal, others will be charmed by the photographs and caught up in the lovely accounts which show how things used to be in rural villages throughout Devon.

#### What did you do on Coronation Day in 1953?

The archive has no photos taken in Zeal for the Coronation and hardly any from the 1977 Silver Jubilee. To compensate I would like to include in the exhibition peoples' favourite personal photos of Coronation celebrations from wherever they were at the time and, from those "youngsters" not around in 1953, a photo from any of the Queen's Jubilees.

We are excited to announce plans for a new community garden and social prescribing project based at Bow Medical Practice.

#### LEMON DRIZZLE CAKE

4oz Margarine or softened butter

6oz caster sugar 6oz self-raising flour

4 tbsp milk 2 large eggs

Grated rind of a lemon

#### FOR THE SYRUP TOPPING

3 tbsp icing sugar 3 tbsp lemon juice

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Grease and line a 2lb loaf tin. Set oven to 180C/350F/ Gas 4
- 2. Cream together the marg/butter with sugar until light and fluffy, beat in eggs
- 3. Stir in sifted flour, lemon rind and milk, mix well, turn mixture into tin, smooth over
- 4. Bake for 40 45 minutes until firm. Whilst cooking, make the syrup topping
- 5. Mix sifted icing sugar and lemon juice and pour over top of cake as soon as it comes out of the oven.
- 6. Leave in tin until completely cold

#### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

The Council held its most recent meeting on Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> January. The minutes of the previous meeting in November are on display on the notice board.

At the open forum at the beginning of the meeting a representative for the owners of Lower Burston Farm made a short presentation about the planning application for 5 new houses, to be built on the site of redundant farm buildings. The Council felt this was a more preferable solution than trying to adapt the existing barns so resolved to support the application. The Council made no comment on two further applications, one at Reeve Castle and one at Venn Lake, Bow.

The Council noted that the recent Village Survey about a possible new Village Hall resulted in a close vote but the majority was not in favour of the idea at present. There was, however, a majority who supported the idea of the Parish Council financially supporting the Village Hall. There are no proposals to do so at present or in the foreseeable future.

In my last newsletter I mentioned the Council has received a quote for a new canopy for the Jubilee Seat in the style of the adjacent village sign. We have now heard that a formal Planning Application must be made. This will be pursued as soon as possible but delays to the replacement are now inevitable. The Council intends to proceed with much needed maintenance to the seat if we can find a contractor to take on the work. Please contact me if you have any suggestions.

Peter Heal, District Councillor, reported that waste collections (black bin) are likely to move to a 3 weekly cycle instead of 2. There are cost savings but it also reflects how much is now being recycled. Other collections will remain unchanged. This information may be old hat by the time you read it, but announcements will be made by MDDC if and when the change takes place.

MDDC is also starting a revision to the Local Plan for the years 2033-43. This is an important process and we await the consultation timetable. Special meeting(s) might be necessary for the village to consider its attitude to further development. This is a subject likely to divide opinion and I would hope that we can generate some village participation.

Plans by a working party to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee next June are now being finalised thanks to the very hard work being put in by a few gallant villagers. The Council has agreed, in principle, to assist with some funding towards the costs and it is hoped as many as possible will participate. More details will emerge over the next month or two.

Finally, the Council considered its precept for next year, starting 1 April. This is the money we raise for the Parish Council as part of the Council Tax on every property. Currently the income of c. £5400 runs slightly ahead of expenditure.

Reserves of c. £11k have been built up for large items of expenditure and these monies are more than sufficient to pay for renovations to the Jubilee Seat. The Council resolved not to increase the precept for next year.

The next meeting of the Council will be on the 31st March in the Village Hall and notice of the meeting will be published in the usual way on the notice board and on the PC website <a href="www.zeal-monachorum.co.uk">www.zeal-monachorum.co.uk</a>. #### **SPECIAL EWE**

The Quick family of Loosebeare Manor, Crediton recently sold a Texel cull ewe for charity at Exeter, with all proceeds going to Dementia UK. The ewe was originally sold at Agri-Fest South West, back in November 2017, by Mike & Melanie Alford of Foxhill Livestock. At that time, she was coloured pink (*see picture below*) and all proceeds went to Cancer Research. She was purchased by Bill Quick who is now, sadly, suffering from Vascular Dementia. His family deemed it only right that

the ewe, having scanned empty, was once again sold for a worthy cause. She sold three times for £200 and was put back up again, first by Russell Steer of Kivells, who had previously auctioned her, then by Ben Comer of Wedmore, and Simon Norman of Wiveliscombe before finally realising £350, bought jointly by Tim Hawkins of Bishops Lydeard and Mike Alford of Stillman's Butchers. A charitable donation from Robert Mackintosh of Milborne Wick Farms, Sherborne brought the total raised to the round figure of £1000. Thanks to all who supported such a worthwhile cause.



#### ZEAL MONACHORUM W.I.

Our February WI meeting went extremely well with an almost 100% attendance. Business included reading out the five resolutions to be voted on for the NFWI meeting in June.

Our speaker, accompanied by her husband, was from the Devon Air Ambulance. She was exceptional - clear and precise - showing, pictures of a new and larger helicopter. We are, it seems, very lucky insofar as we are serviced by either Eaglescot or Exeter. Exeter Air Ambulance flies 24 hours a day and it is hoped that, in the very near future, Eaglescott will follow suit. We should be very aware of the need for this service given where we live. The time difference between the arrival of a land ambulance and the air ambulance is critical in a lot of cases. Thick fog is the only prohibitive weather condition for the Air Ambulances. The organisation is completely independent with no financial assistance from the Government.

March is our birthday month and a fish and chip supper was voted for. Members were reminded that subs are due in April at the AGM.

#### Take a look at these tips on what needs doing in the garden in March

- 1. Prepare your vegetable garden Dig compost or well-rotted manure into your vegetable beds to prepare for the growing season ahead.
- 2. Beware of the evening frost and be sure to protect any tender plants with fleece or by taking them into the greenhouse.
- 3. Keep on top of pruning climbing plants and tidy up winter shrubs. March is a great month to prune varieties such as Sambucus, Buddleia, Hydrangea or Fuchsias.
- 4. Prune rose bushes from mid-March, ensuring any dying or diseased stems are removed as well as shoots which have become damaged. Fertilise soil well with organic compost and rose feed to their base.
- 5. The first lawn trims, lawn feeding and lawn sanding should start in March during dry weather to promote healthy lawn growth through the year.
- 6. Bare patches in your lawn can attract weeds so new turf or re-seeding now along with good watering will repair these patches and prevent any new weeds from becoming a problem for your lawn.
- 7. Continue deadheading spring flowers and any remaining winter bedding so they don't set seed.
- 8. Once the soil starts to warm up again, you can start to plant early varieties of seed potatoes, shallots and onion sets in your vegetable garden. Later seed potatoes require a little more chitting.
- 9. Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials.
- 10. Protect new bulb shoots from insects and slugs with our pest control range which includes natural and organic products.
