What might you do for your community?

In ad hoc conversations with people during our daily walks I am always pleasantly astounded by the breadth of experience, knowledge, jobs, hobbies, interests of people, which are fascinating and sometimes seem like under-used talents.

Zeal Monachorum is fortunate to have a number of voluntary/charitable groups including the Parish Council, St Peter's Parochial Church Council, the Village Hall Management Committee, the Women's Institute and the Fishing Club. All of these function because of the unpaid efforts of numerous people, some of whom give their time across more than one organisation. Their work looks after buildings, land and water, and creates social events, all of which raise well-being and are beneficial to the people of the parish.

In the past there were also youth clubs and parent & toddler sessions. These and other activities could happen again, for example, and the Village Hall Committee might be able provide support to anyone wanting to get something going.

I know that there are many people who are volunteering elsewhere: working in charity shops; helping the food bank; raising money for good causes by sponsored activities; making things to sell etc; campaigning on issues. There are also those who are being good neighbours or quietly doing random acts of kindness.

Did you know that volunteering and acts of kindness cause the release of the hormones oxytocin and serotonin? These lower blood pressure and improve our overall heart condition as well as boosting the immune system, self-esteem and optimism. A study showed that, after helping someone else, many people felt stronger, more energetic, with increased feelings of calm and self-worth. The production of serotonin, in particular, can lead to experiencing happy and warm feelings when we do something kind or helpful for another.

Many people lead busy lives and don't have much time to offer but support to your community can be given in many ways: perhaps try to fit into your weekend dropping by the monthly village hall market - have a quick browse, maybe buy something, have a chat, get a raffle ticket; or go to film night and enjoy the quaintness of having an interval with choc ices and homemade cakes; attend WI as a visitor, you will find it's not all jam and Jerusalem but a place to make friends and hear interesting talks; go to a church service, you'll be welcomed and can find peace within our ancient church. Support of these kinds encourages the volunteers to keep going and the institutions to survive.

Most of our organisations need people to serve on their committees. The amount of time given can vary from turning up to meetings and helping to make decisions to spending time outside of meetings, perhaps preparing for events or doing simple maintenance on a building, or taking an officer role, according to your own inclination and the type of committee.

Of course, there are times when we can feel fed up and frustrated with the decisions made, or not made, by our parish groups. We can grumble among ourselves *or* we can get involved - present alternative courses of action, though in a democracy sometimes one has to accept the majority view.

On 4 May 2023 there are elections for Parish Councillors, nominations must be submitted between 1 March and 1 April.

Maybe you have ideas on how our community could do more for you, or you for it - I'd be interested to hear them.

Church Electoral Roll update. The Annual Parochial Church Meeting is being held in April. The Electoral Roll is updated annually before the APCM. The revision begins on March 1st and closes on March 31st. This project was first applied for in 2013 but the work was not carried out at that time.

Following a meeting with the Cumbria Clock Co, the P.C.C. has agreed to replace the automatic winding mechanism on the hour strike. I have made an application on behalf of the P.C.C. to the Den Brook Community Fund for funding to help with this project.



March is an exciting time with Spring just around the corner and bulbs cheering up the borders. Here are some tips on what needs doing this month.

1. Once the weather has warmed, mix in a soil improver to your soil to help boost plant growth for the coming year.
2. Beware of overnight frost and be sure to protect any tender plants with fleece or by taking them into the greenhouse.
3. Keep on top of pruning climbing plants and tidying up Winter shrubs. March is a great month to prune varieties such as Sambucus, Buddleia, Hydrangea or Fuchsias.
4. Prune Rose bushes from mid-March, making sure any dying or diseased stems are removed as well as shoots which have become damaged. Fertilise soil well with organic compost and rose feed to their base.
5. The first lawn trims, lawn feeding and lawn sanding should start in March during dry weather in order to promote healthy lawn growth through the year. Top tip – Leave a patch of lawn to grow and sow in wild flowers for a mini meadow area that the wildlife will love.
6. Bare patches in your lawn can attract weeds so re-seed now, and regularly water to repair these patches and prevent any new weeds from becoming a problem for your lawn.
7. Continue deadheading spring flowers and any remaining Winter bedding so they don't set seed.
8. Once the soil starts to warm up again, you start to plant early varieties of seed potatoes, shallots and onion sets in your vegetable garden. Later seed potatoes require a little more chitting.
9. Prepare your vegetable garden – Dig compost or well-rotted manure into your vegetable beds to prepare for the growing season ahead.
10. Protect new bulb shoots from insects and slugs with our pest control range including, natural and organic products.

ZEAL MONACHORUM PARISH COUNCIL

The November Parish Council meeting was held on the 26th. Apologies were given for councillors Sally Rowden and Ali Birchwhite. Under various matters for discussion, the meeting was informed that the Jubilee Seat shelter, after 2 years, has now been granted all its planning/ listed building consent. Councillor Hogg agreed to obtain a revised price estimate. It certainly won't be the original £4,000. The meeting was told that some members of the parish would like to have the seat relocated. There was no support for this and the idea was unanimously rejected.

Once again, the possible sites of allotments were discussed, without any positive news. However, since the meeting, a possibility has emerged; it's fingers crossed time on that at the moment.

The high hedges in Western Road were brought to the notice of the meeting. The Chair reported that he had contacted 2 of the 3 owners concerned and that he expected improvements in the near future.

The concept of a 20mph speed limit was raised. The Chair explained that Devon County Council had put aside £150,000 to convert 6 areas outside Exeter into 20 mph limits and they would like to receive applications. It was agreed by the council that we should apply although, having seen the criteria, I would not be optimistic about success. We have tried to improve our chances by offering to contribute to the cost ourselves. Whether we are successful or not there seems to be a definite trend to 20mph limits in all built up areas. It may well be that our past Chair, who sent numerous emails to DCC on the subject, may have helped to start the ball rolling.

There was a discussion on how we should celebrate the coming Coronation. It was decided that the PC, the Village Hall committee and the WI should plan jointly on this. If anyone has opinions on how we should celebrate this event, we'd love to hear from you.

The finances of the council were discussed in detail. We are mindful that this is financially a difficult time for everyone, so we have tried to keep the increase to the precept to a minimum. The increase on the precept represents an increase of £2.00 per month on your Council Tax bill. As with everyone, our regular payments have increased by 10% on last year. We have to put money aside for the Jubilee shelter and the agreed contribution to the repairs to the Church wall. The meeting closed at 8.35pm, the next meeting will be held on Monday 30th March 2023 at 7.00pm.
