



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TONY BREALY REMEMBERS...

There will still be a few people in the village who remember my father, Fred Brealy. He was the Postman in and around the village for 43 years. He first got the post round when he was 22. I don't know if any interviews were involved but his father and the Post Master, John Hooper, were life long friends.


The Post Office at that time was in Yew Tree Cottage (now the home of Susie and Mike Bostock) in Gissage Lane, also known as Rattle Street. His post round was the western half of the village covering the following route:

- \rightarrow From Rattle Street to number 6 Western Road
- \rightarrow Up the footpath between Napleton House and The Elms and down to East Foldhay (formerly the property of the Bowyers, now Youngs).
- \rightarrow On to Loosebeare and then down the track to Stopgate (then two houses).
- → Back up towards Zeal he turned into the footpath leading to Nymphayes Farm
- → Leaving Nymphayes farmhouse, he turned into the Down St. Mary road to North Yeo Farm which is now a barn.
- \rightarrow Across the fields to Middle Yeo (then two cottages but no bungalow).
- \rightarrow On to Lower Week and onwards to Yeo Mill.
- \rightarrow Over more fields to Oak Tree Farm, which was then called Wales Farm.
- \rightarrow Across the road into Merryfield Farm.
- \rightarrow Across more fields to Tucking Mill Farm.
- \rightarrow Up Tucking Mill Hill turning right onto Town Hill
- \rightarrow Left at the top of Town Hill turning right onto Rattle Street and the Post Office.

All in all, a nine-mile walking post round.

Coincidentally, when I left Zeal Primary School to go to North Tawton Secondary School, Dad also re-located jobs and was based in Bow Post Office, which provided him with a bicycle for his post round which was now 16.5 miles. This new round included all of the above plus the Burston Inn (now the Co-Op), Silver Street, (just up the road on the right opposite what is now Bow Garden Centre). From Silver Street, across the main road turning into Hampson and Broadnymet Farms and their cottages. Back towards Bow turning left into Burston Manor, Lower, Higher and Great Burston, Burston Cottage (then called Tin Villa, it sported a tin roof)! From here on to Reeve Castle, Wootten Top Farm, down to Great Wootten (now a deer park) delivering to what was then four cottages, on to Great Foldhay and Barons Wood. Turning right into East Newton, Leigh Cross, down to the Quest. Up the North Tawton Road to Manns Newton, from here, back to base in Bow.

Dad knew the birthdays of the village children and always carried sweets to hand out on their day. He also carried biscuits just in case he had to placate an unfriendly dog! Only in the latter years did he receive one week's paid holiday! Not only, but also, after his daily post round he worked on farms. During harvest time, farming goes on until nightfall. This meant his working day lasted from 6 am starting with the post round, ending at the farm often at 10pm or later. DOLPHIN SOUTH WEST Stair Lifts



EDITOR'S NOTE: I received this letter with a request to include it in this issue.

Dear Editor,

I refer to the "Fishing Club Chat" article in issue 57 (Feb 2024) of MM. The article, which referenced the club's insurance claim, stated that "*they* [the Angling Trust] *felt they were not able to pay out.*". That statement is incorrect in implying Angling Trust chose not to pay the insurance claim. Angling Trust is not an insurer but the national governing body for angling in England. While member clubs do benefit from an inclusive insurance package (provided by a third-party insurer) amongst the many other benefits of membership, the Angling Trust has no role whatsoever in deciding whether a member club's insurance claim is paid or not. That decision rests solely with the insurer. In this rare instance, where the insurer had declined the claim, Angling Trust staff did all they could to challenge the insurer and argue the member's case. Regrettably the insurers would not change their position. A disappointing outcome all round.

On a personal level, I wish the angling club all the very best for the future but felt it necessary to set the position straight on the published mis-statement.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

After many months of research into priorities, costs and tradesmen for the refurbishment at the hall it is with great pleasure that the Management Committee can say that we have made a start on our programme of improvements. Following our success in securing a grant of \pounds 7100 to improve energy efficiency we have brought the ceiling insulation up to current standards and, though visitors will be unable to see the effect, we certainly hope that they will be able to feel it.

You will be able to see that the hatchway between the kitchen and the hall has been lowered making it much easier to transfer things. We hope it won't be too long before the new window shutters are in place – they will also improve the comfort in the hall. However, there is a great deal of expensive work to be done on the fabric of the building which will be carried out throughout this year. Our constitution states that 'the Hall shall be held upon trust for the purposes of a village hall for the use of the inhabitants of Zeal Monachorum and the neighbourhood ... with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants'. The trust allows us to use the funds of village hall for only those purposes and for maintenance, upkeep and insurance.





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JUBILEE SEAT

We are fortunate that Frank Howard was born at the house at Stopgate Cross just within the Zeal boundaries and his attachment to the village meant that he generously gave the original seat to commemorate the 1977 Silver Jubilee, having first presented an identical one to Queen Elizabeth for Buckingham Palace. Here is the original seat occupied by Frank Howard (left) and Rev J Godek.



The seat had been well-loved and used and had a special place in everyone's hearts, young and old. Over the years wear, tear and damage affected the seat until a point was reached where good repairs became difficult to do and the 2012 Diamond Jubilee was approaching. Roy, Frank's son, had helped his father to make the original and he offered to make a replacement incorporating the original crown and leaves with some design improvements to help with durability. In the workshop he found some duplicate parts for the seat which he then incorporated into it along with his own addition which is seen when one looks up. He did the work for considerably less than the actual cost, kindly donating materials and labour in memory of his Mother and Father.

Time passed and the seat again needed some considerable TLC which David Bowyer has recently undertaken. Our heartfelt thanks go to him for all the amazing work he has done. The pictures on the following page show the seat being prepared for restoration and restored to its home.

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ZEAL MONACHORUM PARISH COUNCIL

A Parish Council meeting was held on 25th January, at which we had a report from Margaret Squires, our county council representative. After the usual discussion about our potholes, she gave an insight into the finances of the council. You won't be surprised to hear that it is under extreme pressure, but at least the council appears to be solvent. One of the biggest demands is the number of children in care, over 900 at the moment. A significant reason for this is the dire shortage of foster parents; there may well be people in this parish who could give this some thought.

One of the few powers a parish council has is to provide allotments. In this we have failed, after a couple of false starts. If anyone would provide a parcel of land for allotments it would be an enormous asset to village life.

As you will be aware, the Jubilee Seat is now back in place at long last. Councillors wished to convey their thanks to David Bowyer who has spent many hours in restoration at no cost. (See report and pictures on Page 16 & 17)

The council particularly wants to install some memorial to the late Ken Down and it was decided that a seat with plaque would be suitable. Ken spent much of his adult life as a parish councillor and also on the village hall committee. With this in mind our village hall representative was asked to enquire whether the committee would be prepared to make a contribution and perhaps place the seat outside the refurbished hall. This we considered apt, particularly as the hall is where Ken went to school.

January is the month when we set the annual precept. This comes from the council tax to the Parish Council. In the recent past any increase has been kept to a minimum. Our finances have been severely diminished in the last year, mainly by the cost of the Jubilee canopy and the rebuilding of the church wall. This is, I think, the largest capital expense this parish council has made to date. After much discussion it was agreed to raise the precept by 10%, meaning that every council tax payer would be paying an extra ± 5.04 per year.

The meeting ended at 8.05. The next meeting will be on March 28 at 7.00 p.m.

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Make the most of your garden this March

- 1. Once the weather has warmed, it's a great time to mix in a soil improver to your soil & mulch around the top to help boost plant growth for the coming year.
- 2. Beware of overnight frost and be sure to protect any tender plants with fleece or by taking them into the greenhouse.
- 3. Keep on top of pruning climbing plants and tidying up Winter shrubs. March is a great month to prune varieties such as Sambucus, Buddleia, Hydrangea or Fuchsias.
- 4. Prune Rose bushes from mid-March, making sure any dying or diseased stems are removed as well as shoots which have become damaged. Fertilise soil well with organic compost and rose feed to their base.
- 5. The first lawn trims, lawn feeding and lawn weeding should start in March during dry weather to encourage healthy lawn growth through the year. Top tip – Leave a patch of lawn to grow & sow in wild flowers for a mini meadow area that the wildlife will love!
- 6. Bare patches in your lawn can attract weeds so re-seed now, and regularly water to repair these patches and prevent any new weeds from becoming a problem for your lawn.
- 7. Continue deadheading Spring flowers and any remaining Winter bedding so they don't set seed.
- 8. Once the soil starts to warm up again, you can start to plant early varieties of seed potatoes, shallots and onion sets in your vegetable garden. Later seed potatoes require a little more chitting.
- 9. Prepare your vegetable garden Dig compost or well-rotted manure into your vegetable beds to prepare for the growing season ahead.
- 10. Protect new bulb shoots from insects and slugs with our pest control range including, natural and organic products.
