



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ANDY'S BRAMBLE JUNCTION

My interest in railways goes back to when I lived in London as a child. My Nan lived next to Stewarts Lane Engine Shed, which was the main Shed for Victoria Station. Dad used to take me over to look at the engines being repaired and my interest continued when we moved to Bracknell in Berkshire. At the age of 12 my mates and I spent some of our summer holidays at Reading Station watching the heavily loaded trains going to and from the West Country, Wales and the Midlands, taking notes and numbers from the trains as they passed.

This fuelled my interest in model railways and my ambition to have my own loft Model Railway. So far I have built 4 model railways in 00 gauge but I've always had to curtail the building, mainly due to house moves for various reasons; I never really got beyond the stage of putting down the track and wiring up the layout in any of them.

Having settled in Devon for 26 years, my first build in the loft of our house was less than successful as the temperature variations led to numerous track repairs etc. But once I sold my business and had more time on my hands, I relocated my layout to the garage where the conditions were more favourable. I have spent the last 3 years building what is now called Bramble Junction [my wife's idea] and I have laid the track and wired the layout with a degree of success. I am now bringing the layout to life by adding scenery and other items. My grandchildren insist on having animals, fields, trees and hedges, a challenge for me as I have never before done scenic modelling. The main excuse for my lack of experience in this area is that I have fingers the size of pork sausages, but with the help of YouTube I will carry on regardless!

Some of my collection of models date back to my school days and I have, over the years, slowly built up my assortment of rolling stock to its current size comprising over 40 locomotives, 60 coaches and 75 freight wagons. I have often given in to my weakness for engines and rolling stock when visiting Toy Fairs, despite being told on numerous occasions not to get any more and concentrate on the scenery!

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PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Council held its most recent meeting on Thursday 31st March. There were no electors present and there were no planning applications to consider.

Peter Heal, District Council reported that changes to **black bin waste collections** (reported in the last newsletter) have yet to be finalised.

I can now confirm that a consultant has been appointed to assist with preparing drawings and making the Planning Application for consent for the replacement canopy to the **Jubilee Seat**. Further, I have received an offer to re-furbish the seat. I would hope that both these jobs will be completed by the end of the summer.

Last month, I mentioned that MDDC is starting a revision to the **Local Plan** for the years 2033-43. This is an important process and the PC has already made a preliminary submission. The Council is of the view that provision should be made for community facilities such as allotments and a new village hall. These may, or may not, be linked to the provision of further new houses. We are talking about a timescale of between 10 and 20 years and, of course, the village will be given the opportunity to discuss any proposals in a Public Meeting as they develop. Any development proposal can be contentious, with some believing there should never be any new development, whilst others may feel that carefully considered growth can be the lifeblood of the village.

My thanks go to the members of the working party who have planned a fantastic series of events to celebrate the **Queen's Jubilee** in June. Full details have been published and I urge you all to support the events and meet other villagers, maybe for the first time. (See pages 9 and 10).

The Council received reports that some **footpath stiles** are either damaged or, in one case, almost unusable. Please report them to the clerk if you notice any and he will pass the comments onto DCC.

This year we had very **severe gales** resulting in a number of **trees** coming down. Unfortunately, one of them disrupted power and telephone services for several days in the Western Road area. My thanks to the village hall for opening its doors to assist with phone charging, hot water etc. Global Warming may well increase the frequency and intensity of these storms and we should all be prepared. Owners are responsible for trees on their property and should consider taking professional advice if they have any doubts about their trees, A word of warning, do not assume you are insured, not all policies cover storm damage.

Monachorum Matters has proved to be a real success, but Covid has affected advertising revenue and printing costs have increased substantially. The Parish Council believes this is a Community Project worth supporting but only if there is a sustainable business plan to control income and expenditure. The Council has offered financial support for this year whilst it works with Monachorum Matters on a plan for the future. Advertising is the lifeblood of the magazine and to all those who are advertising, a big thank you, and to those local businesses not yet featuring in print, why not give it a try? Just contact the editor.

This will be my **last report as Chairman** as I intend to stand down from the council at the annual meeting on the 26 May. It has been my pleasure to be involved and as I am generating a vacancy, I would urge you to consider being co-opted onto the council. Generally only 4 meetings or so a year and it is important that we, as a village, have a voice. You need to be over 18 and existing councillors would love to see some younger candidates. Please contact myself or the clerk if you are interested and would like to know more.

The **next meeting of the Council** will be on the 26 May in the Village Hall. This will be the annual meeting and also the annual parish meeting. Representatives of the church, village hall, Monachorum Matters and WI are also invited. The notice of the meetings will be published in the usual way on the notice board and on the PC website www.zeal-monachorum.co.uk. Our climb back up to the village was a discovery of several spring flowers nestled in the hedgerows, especially the star-like purple Vinca and the first early purple Orchids. Together with beautiful primroses lining our route, it was an uplifting sight for us all.

CLIMATE CATASTROPHE - SAVE THE PLANET - RUBBISH

Normally, I am reluctant to write about waste as, in the reality of the climate crisis, it can feel unimportant. Some actions to reduce emissions can seem really hard; but, with waste, it is possible for individuals to make a big difference relatively easily.

It seems likely that Mid Devon District Council will move to a 3-weekly collection of our rubbish for landfill or incineration. Usually, this causes a big outcry; but I wonder whether that's really valid in these circumstances. I suspect that many are in agreement that we would like our council to reduce its spending in this area and spend our taxes on more productive and useful things than rubbish disposal.

However, in a trial of 3 weekly collections of rubbish, it was found that the amount of rubbish had been reduced by a significant amount and recycling increased:

- Urban Sack area of the trial reduced their non-recyclable waste by 24%
- Urban Bin area of the trial reduced their non-recyclable waste by 44%
- Rural Sack area of the trial reduced their non-recyclable waste by 6%
- Rural Bin area of the trial reduced their non-recyclable waste by 30%

What can we do to prepare?

- Check that anything that can be recycled is going in the right box and not just in the rubbish bin;
- Use a dustbin and not sacks, as that seems to help with making a reduction;
- Check what can be recycled. Checking on Mid Devon's website, there seems to have been an increase in the types of recyclable items.
- Ensure that all food and garden waste goes in the blue or brown bins [or, better still, are composted at home]. If these items are sent to landfill they will decay and create methane.

Once you've done the above, carry out an audit of what is going into your dustbin; quantify it by weighing and/or counting how many bin bags. Involve everyone in the household. Perhaps enlist the help of children [none in the household? See if there are any locally who's parents will lend them out!]. They often know more than adults about this subject and care about their future on the planet. Once you know what you are throwing away, and how much, set some targets. For example, you could aim to reduce your rubbish by a quarter within a month; maybe challenge friends and neighbours to do the same and make it a competition.

Check if you can change shopping habits. My rubbish seems to be mainly plastic that can't be recycled - so now I try to buy products like dishwasher and washing machine detergents which come in cardboard; I save plastic hand-wash and other liquid detergent containers, and get refills for them from, for example, the Green

Shop or Stevie Bs; I've reduced the number of plastic bags I use for food storage by reusing ones from food shopping. I recalled how when I was a kid the inner bag of cereal packets were always used for picnics and sandwiches, so I'm again saving them as they work well for storing vegetables in the fridge; In the supermarket, if I'm buying, for example, just a few loose apples, then I don't bother with a bag at all as I have realised that I just throw it away when I get home.

May is an exciting time in the garden with new blooms, longer evenings & summer just around the corner!

- 1. Plant up your summer bedding plants once all danger of frost has passed. Keep deadheading them regularly to help them flourish all summer long.
- 2. Clear and replace spring bedding from borders when it fades, and fork in a general fertiliser.
- 3. Protect less hardy plants from late frost by positioning them in elevated sunnier spots, and use fleece when frost is forecast.
- 4. Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any main-crop or 2nd earlies still remaining.
- 5. Now is the optimum time for pruning your hedges but make sure to check for nesting birds before you start trimming. Prune each stem individually on young hedging and only use shears if you have an established hedge.
- 6. Keep on top of watering during dry spells invest in a water butt to collect any rain water if you don't already have one. Using saucers under pots with thirsty plants and ensuring new hedging is watered regularly during the first year will help ensure you have a beautiful blossoming garden for summer.
- 7. Start mowing the lawn more regularly, and apply lawn feed; you can also compost some of your cuttings.
- 8. Keep on top of weeds, and hoe your beds regularly, as well as using preventative weed killers such as 'Resolva' weed preventer.
- 9. Protect plants from slugs using natural friendly alternatives such as 'Lava-Lite No-Slugs' or 'Plant Grow Slug & Snail'.
- 10. Plan a garden project now such as a patio, shed or summerhouse. Get your new garden furniture and BBQ now in time to enjoy them for the summer.
