

Also, Libraries around Devon and Torbay will be offering warm welcoming spaces along with groups, resources and facilities to help people all over Devon struggling in the cost-of-living crisis this winter. The campaign will cover six themes: the cost of living, loneliness and community connections, food, health and wellbeing, digital access and support, and employment, skills, and businesses. Here's a selection of what will be happening:

<u>Warm welcoming spaces</u> throughout all libraries in Devon. Everyone is welcome to join and spend time in the library, including use of the free WiFi and computers. There are numerous free events and groups including Bounce & Rhyme for babies and toddlers, book clubs, scrabble, Lego clubs, craft sessions and many more. During the winter months libraries will also be working with partners to host sessions supporting energy efficiency, debt advice and other important topics.

<u>A selection of Reading Well books</u> available in all libraries. These cover various aspects of mental and physical health, and include titles aimed at children, teens, and young adults. Digital copies of Reading Well materials are also available through Libby as well as Devon and Torbay catalogues.

<u>Work Clubs</u> in Bideford, Barnstaple, Exeter, Newton Abbot, Crediton, Cullompton, Tiverton, and Tavistock libraries. These clubs offer one-to-one support in CV writing, developing skills and applying for jobs.

<u>Volunteering at your local library</u> is a great way to meet new people and support your local community this winter. There have lots of volunteering roles and opportunities – contact your local library for details.

JUBILEE SEAT, 2

With due respect to the article in the October issue about the Silver Jubilee seat, I would like to correct some of the details given in that report with my own recollection of events; history should be accurate.

In 1977, when my husband Bill was on the Parish Council, he agreed to approach Frank Howard about making a Jubilee seat for the village, and to get an idea of the likely cost. Details were agreed by the Parish Council and a seat was ordered. On completion the seat was collected by Bill and Derek Tonkins, using our tractor and trailer; everyone agreed it was a magnificent sight,

Some time after the Jubilee, an individual with a connection to Buckingham Palace was driving through the village and spotted the seat. This person thought that the seat was very beautiful and took a message back to the Palace. Later, an order was made for a copy which was to be sited at Windsor Castle. With much delight, Frank made a replica which was first displayed at a party held at Morchard Road. At the party, music was provided by Les Delespi, the Queen Mother's bagpiper, who had retired with his wife, Jean, to Monks Cottage at Zeal.

Some while later, Frank and his wife Doris attended a garden party at Buckingham Palace, and were subsequently invited to see the seat at its location near the entry booth at Windsor Castle. What an honour to a truly great craftsman.

Churchwardens Meeting: The Churchwardens of the West Mission Community met at Knowle on Monday 3 October. Arrangements for the Christmas services were discussed and decided (all details will be included in the December issue of Monachorum Matters). It was decided all future 5th Sunday Mission Community

Eucharists will be held at 10.00am. We also discussed the up to date Covid 19 regulations; measures are still in place for everyone's safety and the Holy Communion guidance is as follows:

Holy Communion

1. We are continuing to administer the bread and wine simultaneously. We have not returned to the use of a common cup.

2. We are sharing the peace and only with those people in our immediate vicinity, for the most part, offering a sign of peace without touching.

3. During the Eucharistic prayer we keep the elements to be consumed by the congregation covered.

5. At the breaking of the bread we break the president's portion alone.

6. At the administration, the bread and wine are administered simultaneously, unless a communicant chooses to receive only the bread (communion in one kind) by a shake of the head. The full details are on the church notice board.

Harvest Festival. The offertory at the service was £63.00 which has been donated to the Farm Community Network. Thank you to all who came.

Take away cream teas. A huge thank you to everyone who supported our take away cream teas. A total of $\pounds 270.50$ was raised for Church funds. A special thank you to Margaret Harris for making the jam, providing the cream and packaging.

CLIMATE CATASTROPHE - SAVE THE PLANET - CLOTHING

In the UK the average person owns 115 items of clothing, 30 of which have never been worn. \pounds 140 million worth of clothing ends up in landfill each year. I was shocked to find that I got to 130 items and counting, so I certainly need to put my own wardrobe in order.

I will try and apply the following tips:

- Consider selling, giving away or donating items you don't wear which will make space for you to appreciate what's left.
- If you have items to sell do this first and use the proceeds to buy "new to you" second-hand.
- Get together with others to arrange "swishing" events in which you swap your unwanted clothes for other people's.
- When buying look for longevity only buy garments you can see yourself wearing 100 times to make the environmental toll worthwhile.
- Consider fabrics you're likely to keep a dress for longer if it's not made of sweaty clingy polyester. Natural fibres, such as organic cotton are always a better choice than fossil fuel based virgin polyester/ rayon/ viscose/modal. Some of the new wood-based fabrics such as Tencel and EcoVero are much more sustainable than the fossil fuel based textiles.
- Buy second hand first. Many charity shops have online portals Oxfam, British Red Cross, Barnados on Asos Marketplace, Thrift+.
- Repair clothes rather than throw them away. Good Luck.





November Garden Advice from Bow Garden Centre

- **1.** Plant Tulip bulbs now, making sure they are covered with at least twice their depth of soil or bulb fibre.
- **2.** Insulate your outdoor containers to protect from frost, using bubble wrap or fleece.
- **3.** Plant Shrubs, Trees, and Fruit trees; before the ground becomes too cold & wet (we have an expanded range now in).
- 4. Prune Roses to prevent windrock/ root damage by pruning them by one-third to half of their height.
- 5. Cut down perennials, allowing you to clear any weeds found, then mulch the surrounding soil with bark or Strulch Mulch.
- **6.** Cover empty vegetable beds with well-rotted organic matter during the colder months to improve soil nutrition.
- 7. Plant up a colourful display of Autumn/Winter bedding.
- 8. In case of increasing rainfall raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging.
- 9. Keep on top of leaf raking and keeping your pond clear of all debris.
- 10. Continue to supply wildlife with food and shelter as they can struggle this time of year.
